(3)	20	<p><b>授業の目標 (Course Objective)</b>            Academic Writing II (A) is a continuation of Academic Writing I (A). The goal of this course is to help graduate students develop advanced logical thinking skills that are necessary for writing a clear and convincing academic paper. After completing this course, the students should be able to write English academic abstracts and introductions that meet a high international standard. Those who succeed in publishing at least one English abstract during the course might be employed as an Academic Writing Tutorial Specialist.</p> <p><b>履修条件等 (Enrollment Conditions, etc.)</b>            (1) Graduate students who are able to take classes, and communicate, in English. English Academic Writing II: Structures of academic writing	Chad Nilep	Wed. (3)	20	<p><b>授業の目標 (Course Objectives)</b> This course expands students' knowledge and ability in academic writing and concentrates on written form. Students will produce a publishable book review.</p> <p><b>履修条件等 (Enrollment Conditions, etc.)</b> The course is open to graduate students in any field. You must be able to communicate effectively in English.</p> <p><b>授業内容 (Course Content)</b> The course will describe form in academic writing including the relationship between paragraphs and longer papers, and how each small part builds support for the thesis. Students will practice writing and revising to improve prose as well as arguments. They will also give an oral presentation on a recent publication in their field and write a review article. The course explains the use of citation styles in different fields and how to cite sources. English Academic Writing II: Academic Writing for Research Theses and Papers II	Kevin Teo	Thu. (4)	20	<p><b>授業の目標 (Course Objectives)</b>  The primary goal of this course is to teach fundamental skills in writing abstracts to academic papers, and to develop them into coherent and well-structured essays in English, especially at the graduate level of theses and academic articles. English Presentation II: Drafting and Delivery Skills	Mark Weeks	Tue. (5)	20	<p><b>授業の目標 (Course Objectives)</b> This course has the following practical goals:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. to raise your logical drafting and practical delivery skills to a level where your presentations can be highly effective, anxiety-free, even enjoyable.</li> <li>2. to produce logically persuasive presentation abstracts, scripts and slides related to your research area that you can use as models for future “real world” presentations.</li> <li>3. to develop your competence and confidence in international academic exchange.</li> </ol> <p><b>履修条件・関連する科目等(Enrollment Conditions, etc.)</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Participation in “Presentation I” is NOT required in order to enter this course.</li> <li>2. Graduate students or researchers who are able to take classes in English are eligible.</li> <li>3. Some drafting of abstracts and scripts is done during class time for close consultation and feedback.</p> <p>In pursuing the aims mentioned above, classes are devoted to the following.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Introduction: The different functions and pleasures of presentations</li> <li>The logic and clarity of presentation structure</li> <li>Communicating persuasively the significance of your research</li> <li>Analyzing presentation abstracts/proposals</li> <li>Preparing a model abstract related to your research area</li> <li>Preparing a presentation related to your research area</li> <li>Presentation delivery practice</li> <li>Advanced visual design principles</li> <li>Advanced strategies for Q and A sessions</li> <li>Final presentation preparation</li> <li>Final presentations</li> </ul> <p>* 5-10 minutes is spent in each class practicing the common “small talk” of conferences.</p> <p>Students will be asked to deliver two presentations using slide software or other presentation aids in order to develop skills in presenting and handling question time. German Academic Writing II: Critical thinking, clear writing, revising	Markus Rude	Wed. (4)	20	<p><b>授業の目標 (Ziel des Kurses)</b>          (英) In this course, basic academic writing skills will be taught in German. The ultimate goal is to publish one academic paper in German language.          (独) In diesem Kurs lernen Sie Grundlagen und Anwendung wissenschaftlichen Schreibens. Zunächst werden Sie üben, verschiedene Elemente wissenschaftlichen Schreibens auf Deutsch zu verfassen. Das Ziel des Kurses ist es, eine wissenschaftliche Arbeit zu veröffentlichen.</p> <p><b>履修条件等 (Voraussetzungen)</b>          (英) Graduate students who are able to take classes mainly held in German, ready to work in a team, and willing to engage in a critical discourse.          (独) Der Kurs wendet sich an postgraduierte Student(inn)en, die möglichst zwei Jahre oder länger, mindestens aber ein Jahr lang Deutsch gelernt haben. Sie sollten bereit dazu sein, hauptsächlich auf Deutsch zu kommunizieren (gelegentlich auch auf Englisch oder Japanisch), im Team zu arbeiten und sich wissenschaftlich-sachlich und kritisch mit anderen in Schrift und Sprache auszutauschen.</p> <p><b>授業内容 (Inhalt des Kurses)</b>          (英) Content: Basic elements and structure of academic writing; abstract and thesis statement; critical reading; introduction, main body, conclusion; sources and citations. Procedure: Critical reading; collaborative writing and individual writing; reviewing and discussing the writing of others. Oral presentations, questions and answers, and general scientific discussions will occasionally also be included.          (独) Inhalt: Grundlagen und Struktur wissenschaftlicher Arbeiten; Abstract und Kernaussage; Kritisches Lesen; Einleitung, Hauptteil, Zusammenfassung und Ausblick; Quellen referenzieren und Zitieren. 			<p>Active participation and one academic written work (AW II).</p> <p>(独) Die Anwesenheit bei mindestens 80% der Kursveranstaltungen ist Voraussetzung für eine Benotung. AW II is centered on an actual work of academic writing (hands-on approach) in a setting in which every participant is author, reader, speaker, listener, reviewer and editor. (3)	20	<p><b>授業の目標 (Objectifs du cours)</b> Le but de ce cours est d'aider les étudiants à développer les bases de l'écriture académique en français. L'approche est multidisciplinaire. Il s'agit d'apprendre à rédiger un texte clair et convaincant visant à la publication d'une première contribution scientifique. Chinese Academic Writing II: 技巧与实践 II(E)	Jian Lu	Thu. (4)	20	<p><b>授業の目標</b>        这门课的主要目标是培养学生中文学术论文的写作能力。通过课程的系统训练，逐步引导学生建立汉语思维，并掌握汉语的语言习惯以及论文的写作技巧，以致达到能用中文发表论文的水平。课程计划分为前、后两个阶段，第一阶段是准备阶段，以培养学生的“汉语感觉”为目的，重点语言习惯的培养和思维能力的训练；第二阶段是实践阶段，以写作技巧为主线进行具体的指导与实践，争取在课程结束时，帮助学生完成一篇“名副其实”的中文小论文。</p> <p><b>履修条件等</b>        充分考虑学生的汉语水平，采用汉语或者日语授课。欢迎有此需要的所有学生参加。</p> <p><b>授業内容</b>        在前期课程中，我们完成了以下课业内容：</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) 学术论文的基础知识储备（如：介绍各专业学术论文的特征、学术论文的种类、论文的写作流程、文章构成等等）；</li> <li>(2) 确定选题的方法；</li> <li>(3) 如何根据选题，确定研究方法；</li> <li>(4) 文献的搜集方法；</li> <li>(5) 介绍学生在论文写作过程中经常遇到的问题以及克服的方法；</li> <li>(6) 通过阅读优秀论文，介绍汉语学术论文的整体特征、格式、规范和要求；</li> <li>(7) 介绍汉语的思维与语言习惯，从中、日、英对比的角度出发，分析作为一篇学术论文，中文篇章表现上的“约定俗成”以及语法规则和惯用表现的理据。</li> </ul> <p><b>后期阶段：以写作实践为主，一步步引导学生完成一篇小论文的写作。</b>主要内容包括：</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) 从语言对比的角度，介绍汉语论文的“型”；</li> <li>(2) 如何制定一个清晰、明确的中文标题；</li> <li>(3) 如何简明扼要地概括论文中心论点；</li> <li>(4) 如何建立论文的论证结构，并冠以明确的中文表述；</li> <li>(5) 如何确立论文提纲；</li> <li>(6) 如何撰写论文提要（abstract）；</li> <li>(7) 如何撰写“前言”和“结语”；</li> <li>(8) 行文技巧（比如参考文献的文体、论据的筛选、“引用”的表述、汉语语料库以及资料的收集方法、网页等等）；</li> <li>(9) 学会发表的技巧；</li> </ul> <p><b>成績評価の基準と方法</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(1) 出席次数在总课次的 2 / 3 以上；</li> <li>(2) 课堂表现</li> </ul>
